Message From the CEO | REKAH STRONG, MSW



Dear EOCF Community,

The 2024–25 program year was one of both achievement and transition for our EOCF community. Together, we celebrated the opening of the Ruby Bridges Early Learning Center, named in honor of the civil rights pioneer and located in Central Vancouver. This milestone marked the culmination of our 5-Year Strategic Plan and reflects our long-term commitment to ensuring that children and families in our community continue to have access to high-quality early learning opportunities and essential support services. **This year reminded us that meaningful progress requires both celebrating milestones and navigating challenges with courage, resilience, and vision.**

While we celebrated important accomplishments, we also embraced significant organizational change. We undertook the important work of relocating our administrative offices from Southeast Mill Plain to a temporary home behind Evergreen High School. As our previous Strategic Plan comes to a close, we have already begun engaging staff, families, community partners, and stakeholders in shaping the next five years of EOCF's work. Together, we are identifying opportunities to strengthen our impact, respond to emerging needs, and ensure that EOCF remains a trusted and innovative resource for children and families throughout our region.

Alongside this progress, we also faced significant challenges. State budget reductions to the Department of Children, Youth and Families (DCYF), including cuts to the Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program (ECEAP), resulted in a \$1.1 million decrease in EOCF's funding. These reductions forced the elimination of positions across our organization, including the layoff of 12 valued employees. These difficult decisions underscore the reality of an increasingly uncertain funding landscape and reinforce the importance of growing community investment alongside public funding so children and families continue to have access to the support they deserve.

As I reflect on my seventh year with EOCF, I am filled with gratitude for the people who make our work possible—our children, families, volunteers, staff, Board of Directors, community partners, and donors. Your support, dedication, and commitment to children and families have helped us navigate challenges, celebrate successes, and continue building a stronger future together.

Thank you for being part of the EOCF community. Together, we will continue creating opportunities and strengthening families for generations to come.

Programs and Services | MAKING A DIFFERENCE

EOCF strives to provide a nurturing environment for children and families to stay educated, healthy, and growing. This is done by providing home-based services, transportation to programs, comprehensive healthcare, prenatal education, family engagement activities, and nutritional resources. Among the variety of resources and opportunities EOCF offers to Southwest Washington children and families, the following are key programs the organization provides:



Head Start (HS)

Head Start programs promote the school readiness of children ages 3 to 5, in and out of classrooms. These programs take place inside early learning centers or even at home where families can work with the organization's Child and Family Educators to provide a positive and engaging learning environment.

- Center-Based or Home-Based
- Full-Day Full-Year, Part-Day Part-Year, School-Day School-Year

Early Head Start (EHS)

Offering home-based and center-based models for pregnant people and low-income families, Early Head Start provides pregnant people with resources that promote healthy prenatal outcomes, and offers infants and toddlers (ages 0 to 3) a structure that supports healthy development. Enrolled families work with staff to develop a plan that is driven by family-identified strengths to promote healthy family functioning.

- Center-Based or Home-Based

Early Childhood Education & Assistance Program (ECEAP)

In partnership with the Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF), this state-funded pre-kindergarten program prepares children ages 3 to 5 for success in school and in life. By prioritizing social-emotional health, physical and mental wellness, and family services and support, children and their families have individualized coordination to stay on track to succeed.

- Center-Based or Home-Based
- Full-Day Full-Year, Part-Day Part-Year, School-Day School-Year

HotShots Youth Sports

EOCF is the fiscal sponsor of the local youth recreation program HotShots Youth Sports. Providing basketball programs for Clark County children grades 1-6, the program teaches the importance of teamwork, instruction, fair play, and sportsmanship, all the while offering youth a fun environment to learn.

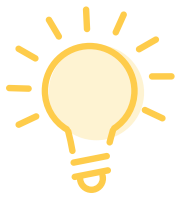

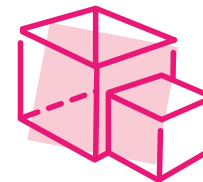

EOCF's comprehensive approach in collaboration with parents aims to address the oral health, nutritional, mental health, social-emotional well-being, and overall health status and care needs of children in developmentally appropriate manner, supporting each child's growth and school readiness.

Regular screenings and observations of children in the classroom are made to ensure program assistance and resources are provided to create a positive environment for success. Through the expertise of our Education Staff and Family Advocates, team members can reflect on the challenges at hand and work with the agency's Resource Team to apply best practices to move forward.

EOCF has experienced an increase in challenging behaviors in the classroom post-pandemic. To meet this need, Child Support Specialist staff provide dedicated, ongoing classroom assistance to support children with complex behavioral and medical needs.

By working directly with families and community partners, EOCF's Health, Family, and Nutrition Services teams work together to ensure all program children have access to meals, continuous health care, and necessary treatment or preventative care. By meeting these needs, children in the program can bring their best selves to the classroom, creating a stable environment to learn.

Program children receive 1/3 to 2/3 of their daily nutritional needs through the organization. With backed research and a national award-winning Nutrition Services team in the kitchen, classrooms are provided with a variety of snacks and meals that cater to unique dietary needs or allergies, as well as cultural backgrounds and religions.



Family Engagement | OUTREACH & IMPACT

EOCF strives to offer every family the opportunity to experience positive, strength-based, and supportive relationships with staff.

Comprehensive Support

At the start of the year, Family Advocate staff meet with families and use the Mobility Mentoring program to help the family complete a family strengths assessment and set goals for the year. Families that request it are provided with additional tools for success (i.e., technology, transportation, interpreters). Each family receives Learning Genie, a communication platform that allows staff and parents to send messages back and forth with automatic translation, allowing parents whose primary language is not English to communicate more easily with staff. Interpreters are employed by the agency and are available for home visits, conferences, phone calls, and family events.

Engagement

Each classroom recruits parents to assist in planning classroom or center-wide Family Engagement events throughout the year. These events each have a learning component in response to parent interest in child development, parenting strategies, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), literacy, nutrition, or other topics parents identify. All communications about family events are sent out in clear, easy-to-understand language and helpful staff members are on hand for family events, planning meetings, and parenting classes to allow for families to experience full participation.

Resources

The agency maintains strong partnerships with a wide network of community organizations to provide comprehensive support services for families. Family Services staff actively refer families to vital local resources—including the Clark County Food Bank, Clark County Public Health, WIC, Lion's Sight Foundation, children and family mental health clinics, pediatric clinics, ABCD pediatric dental providers, SHARE House, Clark College, and WorkSource—whenever a parent-identified need arises or when a service will help a family attain their personal goals.

Parent University

The Parent University program offers structured pathways for adult education and professional growth within the community. This past summer, the program celebrated significant success with eight individuals earning their stackable certificates to become fully qualified Teacher Assistants. Additionally, two participants have advanced to become teacher trainees and are currently working toward earning their Associate in Arts degrees.

Policy Council

The Policy Council provides parents with a formal leadership role and a meaningful voice in program decision-making. Through this Council, parents actively help guide critical choices related to daily program operations, classroom experiences, and the strategic use of program funds. This collaborative leadership structure ultimately strengthens child outcomes, builds parent confidence and skills, and ensures the program remains deeply responsive to the evolving needs of children, families, and the community.



Sharing our Success | MEET ANA'S FAMILY

Q&A with EOCF Program Parent and Family Engagement Assistant Ana Sanchez-Diaz



You've been part of the EOCF family since 2011, and your journey (and family) has continued to grow. When you think back to where you started and where you are now, what stands out most about your personal journey?

“ When I think back to where I started in 2011, what stands out to me the most is how much of a role EOCF has been in my life both personally and professionally. My family and myself have grown and been shaped by the supports and opportunities within EOCF.

I have been able to experience different positions from a Teacher Aide, Lead Teacher, Disability Assistant to now a Family Engagement Assistant. Being able to grow through each of these positions has given me a deeper understanding of EOCF and how all the departments work together to support children and families.

Five of my six children have been in the program. I had two in the home-based program, two in the full-day, full-year program and now my youngest is in the part-day, school year program. I'm thankful EOCF offers many programs that fits families' needs, because there were many seasons of change for me. However, my children always had consistency within the programs of EOCF. There were always teachers who truly cared for my children and helped them grow both academically and socially-emotionally.

As our Family Engagement Specialist, you meet many parents who are just starting their journey. Since you've been part of our family for almost 15 years now, what parts of your own experience do you find yourself sharing with them?

“ When I connect with parents, I share my own experiences to help them feel supported and understood. I let them know that I was once in their position. I had to balance my family's needs, navigate child care, advance my educational and professional goals, and adjust through many seasons of change.

Every family has direct access to a Family Advocate who is there to support both them and their children every step of the way. I encourage families to always ask questions, stay engaged in the classroom, and to know that they are part of the EOCF community. I share my story to remind them that even through challenges and changes, growth, support, and a sense of belonging are always possible. ”

Sharing our Success | BRENDA'S STORY

Q&A with Policy Council Chair Brenda Avelar

You've taken part in many roles at EOCF, from program parent to Policy Council Chair for 2024-25. How has that experience shaped you as a parent, as a person, and as a family?

“Being able to be part of the board for 2 years gave me the confidence and knowledge to be more involved in my children's education, not only with EOCF but their education moving forward. My family as a whole grew our sense of belonging to our community and surroundings. Being on the Policy Council I was able to meet many influential people and be part of many conversations that are not only going to affect my children's lives but for future generations as well.”

As someone who stepped into leadership through the Policy Council, what encouraged you to take that step? What would you say to others considering participating in Policy Council?

“Speaking to EOCF Staff was a huge part of why I decided to join the Policy Council as vice chair my first year and chair as my second. They gave me confidence and guidance to be able to execute my role to the best of my ability. Everything that is needed from you is explained to you until you understand it and they help you through it if needed. You are never alone throughout this journey. This process lets you be part of something larger than you and you get to know so many people along the way.”

When you reflect on your family's journey with EOCF, what experiences or opportunities had the biggest impact on you as a parent?

There were a few different experiences we had as a family, parents and personally that changed the way we looked at the program.

Firstly, doing the free parenting classes that were offered to us were very helpful. Knowing that many parents were also going through the same struggles was refreshing. As a couple going to the Galas and seeing the community come and support our children was so inspiring. We were able to talk to the Mayor, local politicians and many community leaders about the importance and positive impact that EOCF has had on us. A personal experience that solidified that early education is a battle that I am always going to be passionate about was going to the National Head Start Association conference in San Diego with EOCF Staff and a parent in 2024. This was an opportunity that would never have happened if I was not part of the Policy Council.”



Leading By Example | JOINING INSIGHT AND EXPERIENCE

EOCF is governed by two volunteer committees: the Board of Directors and the Policy Council. Both vital to the success of the agency, these committees provide their representative expertise and insight to the Executive Management Team to further the prosperity of the organization.

Separately, the Board of Directors and Policy Council meet monthly to discuss the latest organizational updates, review the previous month's minutes, evaluate monitored data, assess current and future program development, and provide feedback on new ideas brought to each meeting. Since members of these committees differ in experiences and professions, the balance of the two groups provides the organization's Executive Management Team with a holistic approach to evaluating best practices and determining next steps for the agency.

Board of Directors

EOCF's Board of Directors is composed of local professionals and business leaders within Southwest Washington. This includes former program parents, attorneys, CFOs, CEOs, medical and mental health professionals, and local educators – even Head Start alumni. For the 2024-25 Program Year, the Board accumulated 116 volunteer hours.

Policy Council

Representative of the families EOCF serves, the Policy Council is comprised of parents or guardians from each site, along with a few community members. Policy Council provides input and direction to the Board and Executive team on curriculum, fiscal and HR policies, organizational operations, strategic planning, fundraising, and more. For the 2024-25 Program Year, Policy Council totaled 486 volunteer hours.

In the Community

The Board and Policy Council support EOCF in many ways beyond their meetings. They actively promote EOCF at outreach events, fundraisers, and on social media, using their personal and professional networks to raise awareness of the organization's successes and opportunities. Their connections have helped bring in new and returning donors, increase enrollment, and even attract new team members.

History in the Making | PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE SUCCESS



1967

Incorporated as the Economic Opportunity Committee (EOC) of Clark County, the organization started as a Community Action Program agency.

1970s

The agency's focus was exclusively on serving low-income children and families through Head Start, the newly created federal government preschool education program.

1980s

In addition to the offerings, the agency added the Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program (ECEAP) from Washington State.

1990s

- New centers open throughout Clark County and Woodland.
- The agency expanded Head Start services to provide for Pacific County communities.
- Partnership began with Evergreen Public Schools to offer co-taught classrooms.
- To accommodate for larger populations within the regions they serve, the agency became the administrator of the Early Support for Infants and Toddlers (ESIT) program, launched Early Head Start classes, and provided Full-Day Head Start services.

2000s

- Established in the community, the agency's name was changed to Educational Opportunities for Children & Families (EOCF) to accommodate for the services and programs in motion.
- At this time, EOCF assumed sponsorship of the HotShots Youth Sports program.
- Due to the recession, the agency faced significant funding decreases, therefore service expansion slowed down.

2010s

- EOCF utilized the opportunity to refresh the agency's influence. This included hiring a new CEO, Rekah Strong, and introducing new branding reflective of the agency's ongoing impact: To Connect, Empower, and Transform the lives of children and families.
- New centers were opened in Clark County serving locations with growing needs.
- Partnership begins with Battle Ground Public Schools to expand the co-taught special education classrooms.
- The new cohort class, Parent University, was debuted and offered to staff and parents.

2020s

- The COVID-19 pandemic provided the agency an opportunity to provide both in-person and preschool alternative learning services to continue supporting children and families.
- Partnership began with Ridgefield Public Schools' Early Learning program to provide ECEAP services.
- The agency hosted history-making fundraising events, providing the agency with a boost in unrestricted dollars in support of the necessary and effective programming.
- As part of a long-term Facilities Strategic Plan, EOCF purchased two locations in Vancouver (124th Avenue and East 18th) and property next to the Long Beach Head Start Center to support future growth and sustainability.

2022-23

- EOCF Celebrated its 55th Anniversary as an organization and reflects on its growth and success throughout the years.
- The EOCF Nutrition Team received two awards from Washington's Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction for "Excellence in Innovation" and "Excellence in Oversight."
- EOCF secured ownership of the St. John's Early Learning Center and began renovations on the 124th Avenue and East 18th properties.

2023-24

- With a grant from the Cowlitz Tribal Foundation, EOCF successfully purchased property in Battle Ground helping narrow the readiness gap in a critical area of need.
- EOCF's Nutrition Team wins awards for "Excellence in Menu Planning" and "Excellence in Nutrition Education."
- In September 2024, EOCF opened the Ruby Bridges Early Learning Center on East 18th St., honoring civil rights activist Ruby Bridges. The center provides early learning and a donor-supported playground for children in a childcare desert.

2025 & Beyond - A Bright Future Ahead

- EOCF Administrative Headquarters moved in December 2024 to a temporary location behind Evergreen High School. Official mail should be directed to PO Box 872770, Vancouver, WA 98687-2770.
- EOCF began the planning process for its next 5-year Strategic Plan for 2026-2031.
- The Color Their Worlds Annual Gala & Auction raises \$182,000 from generous supporters of early education.
- EOCF is planning to open its next Early Learning Center, named after long-time educator Margaret Selway, in September 2025.
